EARLY YEARS FOUNDATION STAGE



Our Nursery and Reception classes work very closely together on the Foundation Stage curriculum in Early Years.

We aim to make the transition from home to school a smooth and enjoyable experience for all children. Through our strong partnership with parents, we are able to work together to develop healthy and happy children who feel confident, safe, and have a love for learning. We regularly invite parents in to school to meet the staff. Our staff conduct home visits and will also visit the children in their current setting all prior to them starting school in order to make the transition as positive as possible.

We are very lucky to have a great outdoor space for the Foundation Stage so much of our learning can take place outdoors.

The prime areas of learning are:

- Communication and language
- Personal, social and emotional
- Physical development

The Specific areas are:

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the world
- Expressive art and design

To ensure our children make good progress, we deliver a good balance of child initiated and adult directed learning where lessons are meaningful and stimulating for all learning groups. Through the use of continuous observations, our experienced staff are able to identify learning opportunities within play and help move your child's learning forward.

AIMING HIGHER





MINI MASTERS

Mini Masters sessions take place weekly. They are a chance for children who are gifted, talented or more able to plan and deliver sessions to their peers and younger children, developing their own skills at the same time as creating a buzz and awareness around their areas of interest.

Mini masters sessions have covered areas as diverse as sport, art, geography and mathematics.

SCIENCE AMBASSADORS & SCIENCE AWARDS

To develop their love of the sciences, our more able scientists in KS1 and KS2 have the chance to take part in the Kibblesworth Academy Science Awards. Linked to the Crest Awards, children complete a series of challenges at home using our science investigation kits. Results are reported and recorded using our online portal, and stickers are collected as children work towards their awards.

DIGITAL LEADERS

Children who show an aptitude for computing and information technology are invited to become Digital Leaders. These children attend additional computing and coding lessons after school, and learn to support other classes and teachers in their digital work.

SPORTS CREW

Our gifted and talented sports people interview for a role on our popular Sports Crew. As well as supporting and championing PE and Sport in school, the Sports Crew organise games at breaktimes, intra school sporting events, and help to organise and run our annual sports days.

LANGUAGE LEADERS

Our talented linguists champion modern foreign languages in school, attending additional sessions and supporting lessons and language based experiences in KS1. Our Language Leaders also deliver assemblies, and have created a link with pupils from a school in France, working with them to develop resources for our school and theirs.

MORE ABLE PROVISION

All children are encouraged to be independent and self-motivated and develop their abilities.

We believe that the role of the school is to provide a wide range of challenging learning opportunities which will enable each individual, including those with exceptional abilities, to develop their full potential.

We create an ethos which encourages children of all abilities to achieve, to establish a culture where children want to achieve and have high aspirations, and celebrate and reward high levels of performance.

Early recognition of the most able children is extremely important. We keep a register of such children which is continually monitored and updated. When planning work for the most able children, one of our main aims is to encourage mastery and higher order thinking skills.



DEVELOPING CULTURAL CAPITAL



MUSIC TUITION

Every child within our school is offered the opportunity to learn at least one musical instrument during their time with us. Currently, children are learning to play piono, guitar, ukulele, brass, flute and recorder both within whole class music lessons and also in 1:1 and small group tuition.

As well as learning to play and being given the chance to perform, children are also given the opportunity to visit venues such as Sage Gateshead to listen to live music being performed. Musicians from the Gateshead Music Service also visit school to perform in the hall.

ART AND DESIGN

In every year across the school, children are given the chance to learn about and emulate some of the great artists and designers from history. As well as learning about them in school, classes are given the chance to visit galleries and museums to see the real thing, such as in Year 5 where the class visit Woodhorn Mining Museum to view the permanent exhibition by The Pitman Painters and Norman Cornish. Classes also have the opportunity to work alongside local artists, such as Year 6 who had the opportunity to work with local clay workers to design, paint and fire their own poppies as part of their work on Britain at War.

CONCERTS AND SHOWS

From EYFS to Year 6, all children are given the chance to perform in a range of shows during their time with us. Starting with the traditional Nativity play and moving through to pantomimes and shows, all of the children gain a great deal of confidence and enjoy performing for their parents and families across the year. They also have the chance to visit the theater to enjoy a live performance, again broadening their horizons and enhancing their experience in school.



ENVIRONMENTAL WORK

Our school Eco Council work hard to improve our environment, both in school and beyond. As well as developing their own knowledge of the environment and how they can protect it, they also support the rest of the school through organising training and events for the other children in the form of workshops and assemblies.

SAFEGUARDING

Keeping children and adults safe is paramount to everything we do. We pride ourselves on our safeguarding procedures being highly effective.

Our staff continually ensure that all children know that they can approach any of the adults in school if they are ever worried and that all families can be supported and helped whenever it's necessary. As a school we are committed to ensuring the welfare and safety of all children in school.

Every member of our Senior Leadership Team is trained to the standard of a Designated Safeguarding Lead, and are always available to to discuss any safeguarding concerns with parents and families.

Religious Education (RE)

Religious Education We follow the Agreed Syllabus of the Local Authority, which is based on the understanding of all faiths and considers the main beliefs and features of other world religions. The syllabus promotes an inclusive and educational approach to RE.

Sex and Relationship Education (SRE)

SRE is part of the overall provision of Personal, Social and Health Education. It is concerned not only with the knowledge of facts but also with the development of attitudes and values. Children's questions are answered honestly and sensitively, at their own level of understanding. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from the parts of SRE which are not covered by the National Curriculum for Science. We would hope that parents would discuss any concerns with us in the first instance.






THE POWER OF A GOOD BOOK

At Kibblesworth Academy we value the power of reading, and as a result we want all of our children to be confident and proficient readers who develop a life long love of reading. To that end we have created our READING RAILS resources to boost engagement and make every child a reader!

From KS1 to the end of school, children will be guided to find their next favourite book, broadening their horizons, and exposing them to the best children's litererature available.



We focus on two lines per half term to develop a love of reading across a range of genres, with teachers guiding reading choices linked to our Accelerated Reader program. The results are confident, enthusiastic and prolific readers!


All year groups have the opportunity to take part in half termly reading competitions to boost engagement in reading. As each term is themed, this allows the children to develop a real breadth in reading, exposing them to authors and genres which they previously may not have considered.

To support our reading journey, all of our Reading Rails books are leveled and pupils are guided to make a choice that is both enjoyable and suitably challenging. This is done through the use of Accelerated Reader and STAR reader from Renaissance Learning. Through taking quizes on the books they have read, and STAR reading tests at the end of each half term, they can see their progress as their reading age increases and their book choices grow.

> Independent reading runs hand in hand with whole class and guided reading across the school, with carefully selected whole class texts being red half termly, selected to broaden cultural understanding, and linked to the overarching topic of the half term.
